Fashion and Its Social Agendas Aug 17 2021 It has long been said that clothes make the man (or woman), but is it still true today? To assess the impact of fashion on women, Crane uses voices of college-aged and middle-aged women who took part in focus groups. These discussions yield fascinating information about women's perceptions of female identity and sexuality in the fashion industry.
